Speaking a dialect Is Good For Your Brain!

It's official! Researchers in Scotland have discovered that people who speak a local dialect as well as Standard English, and become bi-lingual, are using the same skills as people who learn to speak a foreign language.

There are those who believe that speaking and being fluent in more than one language helps to keep your brain active and healthy. Some even claim that it may help to stave off the onset of brain disorders like dementia and Alzheimer's disease, but that hasn't been proved yet.

The point is, however, that speaking a dialect, like speaking another language, is only really useful if you become fluent in it. The researchers in Scotland have been looking at the local dialect in Dundee, and they have concluded that Dundonian is almost like a foreign language to outsiders because it has maintained its own vocabulary and is widely spoken by local people.

The message for us Northumbrians is clear. If we want to preserve our dialect, we have to speak it fluently, so that it becomes part of our everyday speech and culture. So, haway, whan yuh gan oot, yuh maan taalk proper!
